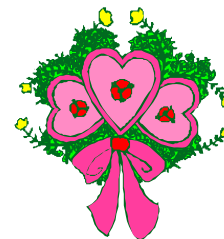
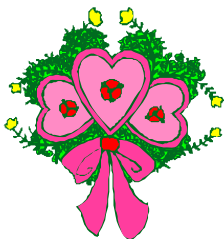

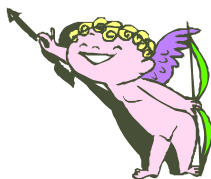
This evening’s program will be on DCS, Decompression Sickness.

Always active in water sports, Paul Humann left a successful law practice in 1972 to become captain/owner of the M/B Cayman Diver, the Caribbean's first live aboard dive cruiser. Beginning in the 1960s, he became increasingly enamored of marine life, diving and, especially, underwater photography. In 1982, he published his first identification book, Reef Creatures – Marine Invertebrates. To date, he has photographed and authored 17 books, and his photos have been seen in National Geographic, Skin Diver Magazine, Audobon and many other publications.

The breakfast begins at 7:30 am and includes a question-and-answer session in addition to the featured alumni speaker's comments.
